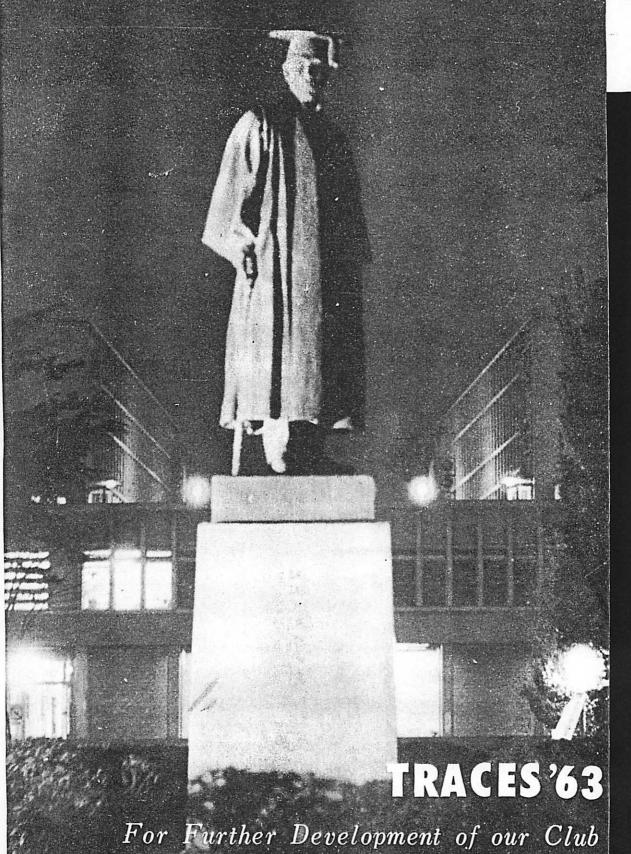


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PREFACE

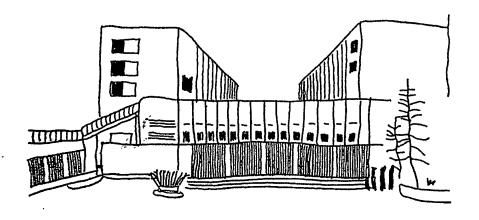

For the significance of circle activity does not lie in winning itself but in its process. I often said to the members, "The world speaks to you in English and you to the world. Let's be more international by studying English." Of course, I knew that Internationality could not be attained so easily, however, I always hoped this would be succeeded by younger generation. For what we have done in the past one year is only the first step.

It was a sad news that J. F. Kennedy, the President of the U.S.A. was assassinated by a reckless young fellow in Dallas on November 22. All the people of the world were very much grieved at his death. As his lofty ideal would remain as reminiscence of the eternal flame, not only in the political field but in the human society, our final purpose, internationality, would never disappear from our E.S.S..

I am afraid many of you might have been disappointed with the big number of members in the E.S.S. In order to solve this problem, our Home Meeting system was devised a few years ago as an entrance having home like atmosphere. But the trouble is that it has become too big in scale. Each Home Meeting came to have too many activities just the same as those of the E.S.S.. I feel as if each Home Meeting consists of one circle having nothing to do each other. Therefore the gap between Home Meeting and the E.S.S. has become grave.

We have had committee conference composed of 20 members every Monday evening and discussed how to carry out this big organization smoothly and successfully. I personally think Home Meeting is developing too rapidly and threatening the E.S.S.. Therefore the existence of Home Meeting system is left as a big subject for us to re-examine carefully.

Finally I would like to extend my heartiest thanks to all of my friends for giving me such a wonterful opportunity to

serve as chairman.

SPIRITUAL HARMONY AND BIG SOCIETY

It is often said that the vice-chairman in our society is very vague in his function, since he has no definite task. This may be true to some extent. But how many of you understand the true role of the vice-chairman, I wonder? The most significant function of the vice-chairman is not merely to have special task, but to take a bird's eye view over the whole society by attending as many activities as possible and put each of them on one stream of E.S.S..

That is to say, the vice-chairman is always required to see and judge the organization objectively. This objective position of the vice-chairman is very important especially in a big organization like the W.E.S.S.. Because in such a big organization, there is always danger of excessive subdivision, following the lack of cooperative and spiritual harmony among the members. When we, the committees of this year, made a fresh start this April, we first faced the obstacle of lack of cooperation and responsibility of the committees. Naturally the results of external activities as Four Univ. Speech Contest or All Japan Debating Contest turned out to be very unfavourable and unsatisfactory. But these failures in domestic and external activities have led to our serious reflection over what we have been doing and, I hope it will all be for the good of our future activities.

In other words, each of the committee members became aware of his responsibility and the importance of mutual cooperation through those failures.

The committee meeting which is held every Monday, has become a place of heated discussion since.

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The cooperation and consciousness of their responsibilities among committee members made the summer camp successful. This success of summer camp is the very good proof that mutual cooperation is essential to our activities.

So, I believe that if each committee makes unremitting efforts toward every activity, we can surely attain cooperative foundation which will naturally bring rich harvest in every field.

Recently, I hear many opinions about the reorganization of our society. Such opinions are expressed mainly because we could not enjoy very favourable outcome in external contests under the present system of E.S.S.. I do not think it reasonable to attribute the causes of our failures only to the organization.

What we should do is not to waste our energy on reconsideration of our organization, but try to find the way to keep spiritual harmony in this big society and bring forth cooperative spirits.

If we fail to do this task, we will be spoiled by our organization that exists for the betterment of our society, for circle activities are fundamentally based upon spiritual harmony among members, not upon the organization itself.

"We must examine each activity more carefully, for

Mr. Yoshida, a treasurer of last year, stated in the ACE No. 4. "Truly, in our E.S.S., most of us regard discussion, debate or speech as the most important activity. But in finance those activities are not treated warmly, compared with drama activity."

OUR PROMISE

Where can we find responsibilities in the organization of the W.E.S.S.? As everybody well knows, the E.S.S. is the biggest club among more than 100 clubs in Waseda Univ. and has about 1,000 members. It is quite natural that the bigger the club becomes the more complicated the organization is. We have 20 committees that are taking charge of the whole activities of the E.S.S.. Especially, the so-called "Big Five" is a key to manage our society well. Under the big five there are fifteen sections. Indeed, the "Big Five" has all responsibilities in all activities, but what is more important is displaying the functions and roles of each section as effectively as possible.

According to the records of each section, each activity has been positively carrying out since April. Actually, however, when I, as one of members of the Planning and Management Group which watches to see if each section's activity corresponds with the principles of our club and controls each activity to be handles effectively, pays attention to the past activities of the club quite doubtful whether they have been well organized or not. No one can deny that a chief of a section tries to devote himself to activities concerned to his section. It's all right for he is responsible for his section. But there is a tendency that very frequently he is apt to neglect other activities which he may consider that are unrelated to section. He sometimes becomes a loose thinker.

I know he is very busy in his study, private affairs, a part time of job and so on. Even though he is very busy, as lo long as he has promised to be responsible for the E.S.S. for at least year as one of chiefs of section, please don't forget what he has undertaken. If he becomes selfish and devotes himself only to his section and doesn't cooperate with others what will the organization be....?

I don't want to repeat the same mistake which we had before. We'll be blamed and lose our trust if we make the same mistake again. I'm sure that such a big man like as he is aware of his selfishness and must feel a sense of respon-

sibility for all activities.

Since he is a chief of the section he must assume any responsibility for further betterment of the E.S.S.. He has been succeeding in a hard task left by his seniors and he is trusted by many juniors. The E.S.S. doesn't consist of you, the individual. There are nearly 1,000 members. 20 committees among them are just like a commander or a captain of troops who takes all responsibilities for his followers. Therefore it's not too much to say that the further development of the W.E.S.S. depends upon the responsibilities of 20 committees.

Why don't you say with a loud voice, "Let's take all responsibilities for the continued advancement of the W.E.S.S."

TO MAKE A GOOD LEADER

If we had much fluency in speaking not only small talk but many other subjects regarded as difficult ones among us, such as political problem, economic problem and so on, we would feel more pleasure of learning English and of exchanging our own opinions each other than now.

To promote our English and to be a good speaker of English I am sure these are the desires of us, English learners. There are many effective ways of mastering English though, I think that discussing things in English with many people will be one of the best ways to answer our desire. Moreover the significance of a discussion is that we can not only brush up our English but also deepen our own knowledge as well as know others' ways of thinking and cultivate ourselves through many times of discussion meetings.

The main purposes of the Discussion Section toward the discussion activity this year are a discussion rich in content, spread of a discussion among all the E.S.S. members, from seniors down to freshmen, and to hold as many preliminary talks as we can before having a formal discussion meeting. So that we, the members of the Section, have been trying to recommend other members to participate in the discussion

meeting.

I myself have advised the leaders of Home Meeting and several group studies to get many chances of discussion. This recommendation has been successful to some degree. It can be proved by the number of participants of each discussion meeting. In almost all cases, participants are over 40, sometimes the number reaches more than 60, although it varies according to the subject discussed. Contents of subjects on which we discuss are devided into several types: political problem, economic problem, social problem, cultural problem and students problem. The number of participants of a discussion meeting depends on a problem. We can not expect so many attendants in case of discussing a little but difficult political or economic problem. On the contrary, if a discussion is on social, cultural or student problem, the number surely is over 40 and the percentage of girlmember participants is on the increase. This would be worthnoticing. We would feel that those subjects are easier than the political and economic problems. The choice of a discussion subject is always a headache to us, the section members. the little between the

At the beginning of the first semester, we made a schedule of more fifteen times of discussion meeting. Almost of them having been already finished, there remain only twice or so during this semester.

Looking back to the discussion meetings so far we've had, what I feel regretable is only that seniors and juniors have been more apt to be indifferent to the discussion activity than the rest. Even in case of a discussion meeting with over 50 participants, more than half of seats are occupied by freshmen and sophomores.

My own point of view is that seniors and juniors are terribly busy with other activities such as group study, many works as committee members or as leaders of the club, and private jobs. I understand those, but that does not make any reason to remain unconcerned with the discussion activity, one of the most valuable activities of the E.S.S..

They should seriously consider their own positions and responsibilities, and should always make an effort to lead their hopeful brothers and sisters.

I suppose the same thing can be said in case of others, such as the speech activity and the debate activity.

It is inevitable for every English learner, especially for a beginner, to get good English materials and chances to practice his English as many as he can. Moreover, what we must not miss is the existence of good leaders around him.

Take a discussion in English, for instance. If there are few people good at English, people of the group can not be expected much to improve their English. Because there would be nothing particular to give an impetus to their English. But when there are many people who are seniors and juniors, others would try to make effort to catch up with the English level of their leaders, and even seniors and juniors would study further when they see others' improvement of English.

Like this, stimulus to English among the members will produce good speakers of English.

The prosperity of the E.S.S. depends on good leaders with good power of English, full of knowledge and fine character. When all the members recognize this fact and make an effort to be such, the discussion activity, one of the ways to promote English and to exchange opinions, would produce a good result from it. Discussion makes a good leader of the E.S.S.. A good leader makes good discussion.

SPEECH IS A MUST FOR LEARNING ENGLISH

Among forensic activities of Japanese students, debate or discussion has become very popular nowadays. It is a great progress that Japanese students have become able enough to discuss their thought freely in English. However, the forensic activities by students should be based on public speaking, I believe. Today, English Oratorical Contests are being held throughout Japan. This contest oratory is the most effective way to train our English. In public speaking, everything depends upon the student's personality. In practicing speech, we train our knowledge and technique in every field of English, that is to say, reading, translating, writing, grammer,

pronunciation and so forth. Moreover, we have to pay attention to our manner, expression and gesture. It is after we have had these intensive training that we appear before the great audience. This sober and hard process of training is the most important thing for us.

To my regret, the members of E.S.S. are apt to neglect this important process. As we had many participants in All Waseda Speech Contest, we held the elimination contests so that as many members as possible could participate. I was very pleased to see many members participating in the contest. But at the same time I was disappointed to find that some of them did not even memorize the text of their speeches. In such a way how can we expect good results? We should realize that to master the art of speaking requires persistent efforts and constant practice. No man has ever become a successful speaker without labour and experience.

We also should keep it in our minds that to listen to others' speeches is very important, too. Indifference to the other participants of the speech contest is another defect of the members of E.S.S.. Let's go to listen to speeches, in order to study English and to cheer up the speakers.

This year we the members of speech section tried to take a lead in giving speeches. This was the first trial, and I hope this good tendency will develop year by year.

All of us now realize the importance of public speaking and it is high time we put ti into practice. Only with everyone's effort we can expect the prosperity of E.S.S..

HOW'S YOUR BABY?

O: Good afternoon, Mr. Takanashi. I hear that you're not participating in any debate activities this month. I wonder if you could spare your time to talk about this year'debate activities.

- T: Yes, I'd love to, if I can be of any help to you.
- O: You've been in charge of debate activities. I know you are very fond of debates. What's the significance of debating in English?
- T: A debate contest is often referred to as "an intellectual game", a kind of competition in which every one wants to beat his opponent. The desire to win supplies a strong incentive to higher achievement and is commendable in the degree that winning is correlated with performance of merit. That is, it is very significant for us to devote ourselves entirely to one thing for a month or so.
- O: I know it took you more than 7 months to prepare for the first debate contest. Could you tell me what you thought when you became chief of the youngest Section in the E.S.S..
- Frankly, I thought that it would take three years for our debate section to become stable and active enough. know it was only last year that our debate section was founded and our section was in the infantile stage. This year it has come into its youth. Now is the time to know. And if it developed well, it would no doubt, be in its prime next year. So I thought what I had to do this year was to put our section on a firm basis, and thus to develop it so that it will reach the prime of life next year. This, of course, includes many things, such as bringing up many promising debaters who will be able to play an active part in our debate activities next year, introduction of debates to the members. It may sound to you that I only think of the debates for next year. But it's not true. As one of the committee members of this year, I am responsible to carry out this year's activities all in success. I know our burden is so heavy. I feel sorry that we have not been able to obtain satisfactory results yet.
- O: For this, you have been doing your best. Debates are getting popular among the members of W.E.S.S.. They took up a debate for a home meeting activity. I think this is a very favorable tendency for our future debates. You said that you haven't been able to get any satisfactory results. What made you think so?
- T: Well, it's pretty hard to say in a few words what was wrong with our debates. To win a debate contest requires many

things, yes, many things indeed. But I dare to say that our failure was largely due to the lack of cooperation. The same thing can be said as to discussions, speeches and drama activities. It was only 4 or 5 debaters who could participate in the contests, while in other universities, many students are available at any time for contests. They come to every contest and try to learn a lot from it. Don't you think this is what we should do. What is most needed is the tight cooperation among the members. This is prerequisite for any club activities.

O: I think you have had a hard time to carry out our debate activities, haven't you?

Yes, it takes at least a month to prepare for one During this period, careful study on a debate topic T:is required. You know, we've had a debate contest every So for the past 7 months, I spent every single day Debate after debate, for the preparation of the debates. this has been my life since last March. And this will continue until a new debate section chief is nominated. enjoyed the past debates very much. I can remember the day as if it were only yesterday when I circled Yamate Line just to kill time. We studied all night at one of the "all night coffee shops" in Shinjuku, and left there the next morning, but it was too early and we could not find only place to go because all the buildings were still closed. I suggested to tide air was so cold and we were so sleepy. on a train. So we were on! We slept like a log in the train until we could see the bright sunshine while circling Yamate Never before had I seen such a bright and beautiful Line. sunshine.

"MY DREAM"

Today we have a great number of members in our Society, so we cannot expect effective activity without H.M.. But it is often said that the activity of H.M. is confused because there are many activity in E.S.S. and because there are many members in each H.M.. When I was elected as a chief of H.M. section, I thought that, though it is difficult, we can have effective and smooth activity of H.M. under today's structure. I noticed, however, that I could not take any effective measures even after I finished half year of my term. Now I write this story not to reflect my attitude nor to critisize the activity of E.S.S. but to mention just my ideal of the activity of H.M..

Now E.S.S. consists of 7 Home Meetings. The problem is that each H.M. has a great number of members, so it is better to divide each H.M. into 7 or 8 groups. Then each group would have 10 or 12 members who live very near each other. leader of a group should be a sophomore or junior. meeting would be held at leader's house or other member's house once a week or twice. At the meeting English would be spoken all the time. Similar kinds of system have been made at beginning of the H.M.. So we can say that H.M. would have a home like atmosphere by taking this system which was recently lost. I think this is one of the best ways to master daily conversation. Because it is at home that everybody learns how to speak his mother tongue. Each group of H.M. would find a foreigner, to whom the members of the group visit once a week, to discuss political, economic, social or cultural matters. It is a good way to master English conversation to have a close contact with foreigners whose mother tongue is English. whole home meeting will be held once a month or twice. activities are such as discussions, speeches or debates, etc. Each H.M. would have its own room. (In order to do so, E.S.S. should have its own building.) They could have discussions or speeches there. Leaders of the H.M. should be an committee of the E.S.S.. It would be better if a Junior were a leader of Then we can easily solve the conflict, Which we have now, between committee meetings and the leaders of the H.M.'s. If the leaders of H.M. become committee members, there is no

need to have leader conference. All things concerning H.M. should be decided committee meetings. At that time the chief of H.M. should be a member of the big five, or we could say big six.

You may say that I emphasized too much H.M. activity. But I think it is proper to do so when we consider the significance of H.M. is not just of way to enter the E.S.S. but a fundamental activity in mastering English conversation.

ZOLY'S REPORT ON GROUP STUDY

Someone once said, "You can determine the greatness of a country by how much time, effort, and money it spends on its schools".

From this statement, we can see how important education is. That has become a fundamental policy of a country. What he said incertainly true. Because we could adapt this statement to our club as it is.

What is the way of education in our club, E.S.S. then? It's certainly "Group Study" activities of our section and write down what I have thought about them.

May 1, group studies started formally. Of course, before they started, we members of G.S. section had many things to do. Even during spring vacation, we got together to discuss, in order to make the G.S. activity go well through this year. At that time we recognized how important this activity is, though it does not attract much attention of the members. Moreover we dare say, the prosperity of our club depends upon that of G.S. activity. So we made our mind to do our best this year for it.

April, when everything starts in school, we got busy with seeking for the rooms of G.S.. Besides the jobs, we had to find the leaders of each group and to make out more than 40 groups. We devided them into three types, Introductry course for freshmen, Advanced course for sophomores, juniors and seniors, and General course for everyone for studying the

Bible, newspapers, chorus, reading and so on. This is not so difficult.

We paid a greater part of attention to select the leaders.

As we above-mentioned, the prosperity of E.S.S. depends upon that of G.S. activity. In other words, however, we can say, it depends on each leader of G.S.. Because their sincerity or energy toward G.S. might play an important role in leading this year's G.S. to success, we thought.

Just before the start of group study, we had two jobs; one is the meeting for freshmen to explain G.S. and the other is a leader conference.

Every year, in our club room, there occurs a confusion about G.S. that is, how to register or what is the difference between introductry course and general course and so on. So we hold this meeting for freshmen to explain all about G.S.

At the leader conference, we asked each leader to offer his plan for his group and to decide his sub-chief. This sub-chief system is very important. Because without this most of groups will be canceled as in the past, when each group leader gets busy with his work, especially in autumn.

May 1, Wednesday, was the day when G.S. activity began. Various group study (47 in all) have been held every day (except Sunday) from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

And according to the agreement of our club, it's decided that every member is required to choose at least one group study.

So since 47 groups started, we have had to visit our club room every day to see if every group study is going well. And through the attendance book we also had to know how many members were attending their groups.

Anyhow, we must pay attention to G.S. activity in a brid'seye view. So whenever we met G.S. leaders in the club room, we asked them with this greeting "How's your group?"

As for the leaders this year, no sophomores led any group, being different from last year's. For sophomores, they

But even while I am writing this, I cannot think of anything I would rather do than to live earnestly at present and in the future.

To "live earnestly" has many meanings. Sometimes it means to be honest. Sometimes it means to have perpetual vitality. Sometimes it means to have perseverance in what we are doing. Sometimes it means to be able to contemplate, when we are in a pince.

However, it is actually difficult for us not to tell a lie, which means that we should not be dissatisfied with our own conscience. We love a person. A man has his own worth. Everybody has it. But, if he has an unforgivable weakness, I don't see how we could love him. What is this unforgivable It is untruth. weakness? It is a lie. It is falsehood. The most dangerous crime we could commit in theatricals would It is the same in our lives. be false imitation. that we ourselves hate them once we've found our lives. can believe nothing, if there is only one lie. Even Kennedy and Khrushchev --- will expect mitigation in the military But why couldn't they reach the same conclusion? expenditure. It is from lies, untruth!! I also refer to "perpetual vitality", "perseverance", and "contemplation in a pinch". Among them, "Contemplation in a pinch passes as one of the iron-bound rules whenever, wherever through our life. I would not like to decide the value of a person. makes me believe that a man's value can be measured by his attitude when in a pinch. The question is what he will think, what he will do, and how he will behave in a pinch.

Words are not necessary in a pinch!!

MOTHER FOR MASTERING ENGLISH CONVERSATION

with a great care and mimic it faithfully. Over and over
again. Moreover, she will correct your bad pronunciations,
when you listen to your tape-recorded pronunciations. What a
nice mother the taperecorder is! Why don't you use her much
more?

Audio Visual Aids Section has a few mothers in this sense. It is trying to lend them so far as the facilities permit. They will help you to master English. And A.V.A. Section will also be one of main springs of all activities of E.S.S..

SIGNIFICANCE OF LIBRARY SECTION

There are so many reasons why we learn English. Some want to understand the life, habits or customs of the people who speak English as a mother tongue. Some want to use English for their work. Some believe that the knowledge of English can help establish the world peace.

We obtained 11,000 yen to buy books this year. This amount of money was not enough to made a good library. So we, the members of the library section (8 persons) gathered to decide what book we should buy with this small amount of money. As a result of a series of discussion, we came to a conclusion that we should buy such books that individuals cannot buy easily. Since speech, discussion or debate activities are the major project of the E.S.S., bought Kerkyusha's "New English-Japanese Dictionary" and Fower's "Fundamentals of Speech". In December we are going to get a book about Debates from the

U.S.A., since we plan to travel there next year. In order to have a good result in Drama performance like we did last year, we also bought Gallaway's "Director in the Theater". We also purchased the monthly "Shimbun Geppo" to make us familiar with discussion.

Once a week, usually on Wednesday, we have a discussion meeting to view clear on the situation, and before going into a discussion we read "the Mainichi Daily Newspaper" as one of the materials which is being sent by an old member, Mr. Sumino. On Tuesday or Friday we have newspaper clippings pasted in our scrapbooks. They are classified into four large groups; Domestic Politics, Foreign Affairs, Economics, and Culture. We can find the I.L.O. problems, Rising Commodity Price, Tax Equalization, Laos Problem, Soviet—Chinese Competition, Negro Problems, Nuclear Test-ban Talk, Malaysia, South Vietnam Problem, and so forth. And those are for discussions and debates.

We hope everyone will make best use of our library.

Then, for the first time, we can understand the real features of Waseda, enjoy our college life and find ourselves true Waseda graduates.

As you know well, the university is not only the place to find the employment profitably. This is only aspect of the university.

We, the student, must establish our own independence, during college life by considering our mission.

Therefore, we must not utilize this environment as a place to escape from apathy or contradictions around us, and not utilize it as a place to divert the dissatisfaction at the poor lecture or to kill the time.

Otherwise, we can never expect any constructive result from our education. It is indispensable for us to remember that academic life is just a place where we find the interesting things by ourselves and make use of our past experiences to improve ourselves.

Then we will find our campus life fulfilled. And, I am sure that we can become an adults without being sacrificed by mass-production education.

WHAT I FEEL ABOUT I.S.C.

The 10th International Students Conference began in July 14 and ended successfully in August 15 under the auspices of I.S.A. of Japan. The foreign participants were almost 40 and they were from 15 different countries.

The I.S.C. is the biggest annual event which we I.S.A. of Japan sponsors in order to realize our objectives--- to

promote mutual understanding among the students of the world through cultural exchange.

The Conference of this year was composed of Main Session, study tour, I.C.S.O. (International Conference of Students Organization), and Farewell Meeting.

Here I'm going to report these four phases of the conference. At main Session, participants could express their individual opinions about almost any aspects of the world, politics, economics, religion, education, etc.

The session aimed to have the students get to know one another and cultivate friendship by exchanging opinions regardless of ideology, social system, or national interest.

Study tour was designed to let foreign students see the actual picture of Japan through travelling all over Japan and the tour was taken care of by 10 chapters of I.S.A. of Japan; Hokkaido, Tohoku, Tokyo, Yokohama, Nagoya, Kyoto, Osaka, Kobe, Okayama, Kyushu chapters.

International Conference of Students Organization (I.C.S.O.) was born two years ago for the purpose of realizing our dream from the stand point of delegates from the authorized organizations, not from individual.

Farewell Meeting was for reporting the activities carried out with some comment on the whole I.S.C..

Now I want to explain something about I.S.A..

I.S.A. was born in 1934 as Japan-America Students Conference, aiming at promoting mutual understanding through cultural exchange, it was successfully run until 1941 when World War II broke out.

Our seniors of I.S.A., thinking over those situations, established new association--International Student Association, for the purpose of opening windows to all the nations in the world.

They believed that, so as to realized the purpose of I.S.A. newly-born student organization must be independent from the government of participating countries, non-partisan, and non-

religious. And the association should not be influenced by ideology, social system, and national interest. The policy if still alive deep in our mind.

What I mentioned above is about history of I.S.A..

Nextly I want to tell you what I felt about 10th I.S.C.. In spite of our policy, the foreign participants were influenced a great deal by ideology, social system, and national interest. It seems to me that the foreign students lost their righteous judgement and are becoming followers of their Government.

Once our talks touched upon things concerning ideology, the pleasant atmosphere, that we had before disappeared immediately and they become somewhat historics.

Generally speaking, Japanese students are optimistic or extremely pessimistic, for they have not enough righteous judgement to catch what is going on in the world. This tendency may be caused by insularism and lack of experience.

Consequently to 70 foreigners, opinions expressed by the Japanese students may have sounded childish and sometimes old. Japanese intelligentia including university students, may be ranked the 2nd class in Japan.

On the other hand, foreigners' opinion was full of enthusiasm as it stands upon fact and experience.

How can we let them listen to us. They could express their opinions most clearly. There are tremendous gap between Japanese students and other foreign students, especially those of developed countries.

This is the thing that impressed me most during I.S.C.. In fact Japanese students are in the ideal position to promote mutual understanding, and detract any kind of prejudices from the students of the world.

We, Japanese students, are genuinely neutralistic, and full of good will, and we have no prejudice to any other countries. Let's try to melt prejudices. Let's do our best to promote mutual understanding.

Fortunately we are members of E.S.S. English must be a

means to accelerate cultural exchange.

The door is open to every one of you to attend I.S.C. next year. This is the very chance to meet the purpose of learning English.

Finally, take the saying to heart.

"You speak to the world, and the world to you".

To construct these things, studying English only is not enough.

If I were a manager, I would have the book-reading meeting in Japanese. It would be a good opportunity for E.S.S. members to describe what they think and feel from the bottom of their hearts. And also I would have other recreational meetings.

Through these activities, Freshmen would increase their interest in English.

VIOLENCE

A number of people were forming a queue waiting for buses at a bus stop. Suddenly, a man squeezed in the queue. A student saw him and told him not to squeeze in. But the man did not pay any attention to him. He beat and injured the student. The other people around these two men just looked at them. None of them would try to extend a helping hand, to the student nor would they run to a police box. They ignored ignorance.

When I read this article in the newspaper the other day, I felt badly.

If we do not help each other, how can we defend ourselves against this kind of petty violence?

The campaign against petty violence has been widely distributed, mainly by various means of communication such as newspapers, radio and television.

People began to turn their eyes to petty violence and strongly support this campaign. This was the type of campaign to make cities more comfortable and proved effective to banish petty violence.

Have we not forgotten something important? I'll tell you now what it is. As petty violence hurts a small number of people directly, we can have a look at it very clearly. As this kind of violence occurs in our daily life, we are forced to feel it directly and we have some interest in it. But there is another kind of violence which does not occur in our daily life and to which we are apt to feel indifferent.

Usually this violence is committed on a large scale and hurts a great number of people. I would like to call it "harmful violence." It is very difficult for us to catch the whole aspect of it. Here is one good example. The election

of the Governer of Tokyo was held in April this year. Mr. Azuma, the representative of the party in power, was elected as the Governer of Tokyo. However, it is said that the largest violation of the election law in the Japanese history was committed in this election.

Not to mention, a fair election is the foundation of democracy. Although democracy is the base of our life, this principle was violated by this election. I expected that the strongest opposition against this violation of the election, in other words, this kind of harmful violence, must occur among the people. Contrary to my expectation, neither mass communications not public opinion did not show any apparent interest in this matter. Newspapers treated this matter less important than a simple traffic accident.

I asked many people about this problem. Someone answered, "The general trend of the election has nothing to do with this violation."

Another said "We have so many violations of the election law in Japan, and so many representatives are guilty this crime. And it is quite unfortunate that the violation of the election law was found in the particular situation." These simple answeres tell how indifferent the people are to this kind of violence. When I take this into consideration, I can't help feeling pesimistic about the future of Japan. This situation is far from reassuring.

We have the old saying, "Don't kick against the pricks." I hate this saying. But the Japanese seem to have a tendency not to question this proverb. The Japanese are quite general concerning this harmful violence such as corruption, embezzlement of taxes and as well.

But can we be indifferent to this harmful violence? Can we allow the violence to occur? Of course, NOT.

All of us are responsible to banish harmful violence. It seems to have nothing to do with our daily life, but it is this harmful violence that steals into our life unconsciously and destroys our foundation of living.

Let us turn our eyes to this harmful violence.

Let us help each other to banish all harmful violence from Japan.

LEARNING ENGLISH

THE ROAD TO THE TOKYO OLYMPIC GAMES

"How many gold medals can Japan win in the Tokyo Olympic Games next year?" "Are roads and hotel accommodations ready for the Olympics?" "Where can I buy a ticket for the opening ceremony?" We often hear these questions about the Tokyo Olympic Games nowadays.

It was Dr. Tadaoki Yamamoto, chairman of the Japanese Student Athletic Federation, in 1929. On July 31, 1936, in the 35th I.O.C. General Conference, they decided

that the 12th Olympics would be held in Tokyo. But under the acute world situation, Tokyo was obliged to give up the Tokyo Olympics. The 26th of May, the 34th year of the Showa era this day can not be forgotten by the people who are engaged in Japanese sports fields. In the 55th I.O.C. General Conference held in München, West-Germany, the votes to decide the place for the 18th Olympic Games were cast. Shingoro Takaishi and Ryotaro Azuma, committeemen of I.O.C. from Japan, were nervously waiting for the results. After a while they got what we Japanese wanted to have for a long long time amidst thunderous applause from other committeemen.

Tokyo is indeed qualified enough to have the Olympic. In addition to that, there was one more reason favorable to Japan in the 55th I.O.C. General Conference. That was a fine English speech given by Goro Fujita. As he was a diplomat in the past, his English is excellent. Moreover, he has been on 30 minute T.V. programs very often, so he was accustomed to giving 30 minute speechs with much substance. On the other hand, the delegates from other countries made very long speeches. Goro Fujita was successful in impressing the committeemen with his short but inforvitive English speech. It probably sounds very curious to you as Japanese are often said to be very poor at mastering foreign languages.

The official languages in the Tokyo Olympic Games will be French, English and Japanese. Many tourists from foreign countries have had trouble in languages in Tokyo. Next year Tokyo will have more than 100,000 foreigners from various countries, so many problems in languages can be forecasted. I hope every member of our E.S.S. will help them in English. Miss Setsuko Kurose, Mr. Masahiro Tomikawa and I were fortunately successful in the examinations for the Olympic Interpreters from our chapter of E.S.S.. We'll try to do our best as interpreters next year, I promise.

The motto of the Olympics is "CITIYS, ALTIUS, FORTIUS" in French or "Faster, higher and Stronger" in English. The purposes of the Olympic Games are to cultivate a sould mind and a sound body through sports, and to deepen mutual understanding among people in the world by getting together in one place for athletic competition, and contribute to the world peace in the end.

Not everyone of us can participate in the Olympics, but

we E.S.S. members can help to make the Tokyo Olympics successful by using our knowledge of foreign languages. It is high time to study English and other foreign languages very hard.

The Japanese people do not express our own feelings frankly. Why, I wonder.

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I'd like to look back upon the Edo era, the so-called feudal times which lasted for almost three hundred years.

Society was divided into four classes, the samurai, agricultured, industrial and mercantile classes. And the samurai were absolutely free to sway the other classes not only in government but in other social fields. But people in general were not free to express their own feelings freely. If they had protested against the samurai, they would have seen a dazzling sword before their eyes. What's worse, they could not even get angry at the samurai's wrong. If they did so, their necks were cut by his sword.

Because the efficiency of operation partly depends upon the exact number of members in each section. For instance, look at the drama activity! The chief of the drama section always calls the roll strictly, and takes a very severe attitude toward absent members.

Now, my readers, I think the above proposals already have been considered by all members who have common sense. So, I hope in the next year, the five committees of E.S.S., the leaders of each section and G.S. will try and institute these above memtioned counter-measures.

THE PROBLEM OF ENTRANCE EXAMINATION

"Hell of entrance examination" These words suggest the present state of Japanese entrance examination system. Neither children not parents can forget about the entrance examination for a moment. Parents often force their children to begin preparing for it just after entering elementary school. Children study until they are so tired that they appear to have forgotten how to play. Parents in families, teachers in school, persons in society, all take a pity on children who are sacrificing health and development of well rounded personality merely to do well in entrance examination. But they think it extremely important for children to enter a famous school in order to gain an advantage in finding good employment. Therefore they regard their excessive studies as unavoidable and cheer them up by painting pictures of the employment benefits they will derive from passing entrance examination.

We often hear that some children wear joyful looks, when they find their classmates absent from school because of illness. Why are they pleased? They are pleased because they think they can take advantage of their absence. They long to make their names high on the list, even at the price of classmates. Classmates are regarded as enemies; sometimes they even wish that their classmates would die.

What makes them think this way? There must be many reasons. But mainly, I dare say, it is their parents. Shrinking from their responsibility parents leave the character education of their children to the school. But unfortunately at school, energy is directed solely toward intellectual skills necessary to pass the entrance examination. This means that children are not given any opportunity to enjoy moral education.

The problem of entrance examination is so knotty that it has been allowed to slumber. But please visualize the society those children will make. I am afraid that selfishness and exclusiveness will breed. The virtue of modesty will be non-existent; we will always meet with a self-approv-

ing attitude. It is needless to say that we can never tolerate such a society. These evils have their source in the present "hell of entrance examination." So we cannot allow this Problem to slumber any more.

We can say society has responsibility for this problem, but it will be unrealistic to expect society to take the lead in improving the present state of Japanese entrance examination system.

Children are suffering from "examination neurosis"; the neurosis is attacking their spirit. I wonder why parents do not realize that this neurosis has its seat in their own attitude toward the entrance examination. I think that parents should realize their errors. They are encouraging their children to pursue only materialistic happiness. They do not give their children influential moral education possible in the home. They expect much more of their children than their actual ability allows thus overburdening them and making errors in planning their careers. Finally I should like to say, parents should be the first to take the responsibility for the problem of entrance examination through making it possible for children to harmoniously receive three factors of education: intellectual, moral and physical. I think this type of education is essential and urgent.

One day at the end of the summer, I happened to call at a foreigner's house with my father. As I remember, it was when I was only four or five years old.

There was a green lawn and the building was painted pure white.....you can see such a western style house anywhere, now, but in those days it was very strange to me. My father pushed the door bell, and I was standing on the step behind The door was opened, and they welcomed us with warm smiles saying something very quickly. I'm sorry to say I did not understand it at all. No wonder! It was English. For a first while I kept silent and behaved myself. But in my mind I was awfully surprized to see that they, two children and their parents, kept their shoes on even in the house, and, of course, we did not need to take our shoes off, either. Soon the two children, a boy and a girl, with blue eyes and blond hair and I became good friends. All of us were almost the same age. We played hide and seek and ran around the garden. They spoke to me in English just as they did to their I spoke to them in Japanese. Of course, it was very inconvenient. But, I remember that I enjoyed myself. That was my first time to listen to English. Several years after that, I began to study English at junior high school. I was in high school, and I thought that the significance of studying English was only that it is an international language. I especially used to think that if I had been able to speak English fluently, I could have had a much better time that day. I mean the day when I visited the family with my father.

I am sure the fact that English is an international language is most important. I believe that is why a lot of people want to master English.

Besides that, I found another more personal reason for learning English after six or seven years' study. I found that to study English, is to understand Japanese more thoroughly. I think any foreign language is the same. Let me speak about it a little more.

First I'd like to ask you if you have had the experience of making a mistake when you used 'Yes' or 'No'. I have made many mistakes and even now I do. For, in Japanese, we use 'Yes' and 'No' in quite different ways.

Suppose you are asked in Japanese, 'Wouldn't you like an apple?' You may answer 'No' even if you like apples. If you don't like them, you must answer 'Yes', or you will have to eat apples by all means. In Japanese, you have to answer considering what the speaker says. When what he says is true, you have to answer in the affirmative even if the fact is wrong. On the contrary, in English you have to answer thinking of the fact.

I think this difference seems to show each national character a little. Those who produced and speak English seem to think rationally and prevent daily life from being confused. The Japanese look, unreasonable and irrational. But from another point of view, the Japanese may be always trying not to hurt another persons feelings by giving a negative answer.

When we give someone a gift, we very often write on the wrapping paper, to translate literally, 'This is a bad and humble thing.' Of course it is not a bad thing, it may be a very wounderful gift.

And sometimes Japanese, especially our parents, those of the older generation, say, 'This is the only one.'
'...only a little.'

One morning when I was a child, a large box was delivered at my home. It was a box of sweet pears, inside, we found a card with the name of my uncle who lived in the country.

My mother gave several pears to a neighbour saying 'These are the only one.' When I heard her saying that I was puzzeled and I asked her later, 'Why did you say those were the only one?' You gave six pears to Mrs. Tanaka, Mother.

But soon, as I grew up, I began to think it was quite natural without realizing it. But I am at a loss to know how I should express those idioms in English. I could not find such expressions in any English conversation books. Then I found that those common expressions are peculiar to Japanese. Here is another one which it is impossible to find in English books.

At a dinner party a Japanese hostess will say, 'There is nothing to eat, I'm afraid the food doesn't taste good.' Forigners might think she is blind when she says there is nothing to eat, for the table must be decorated with many delicious foods.

These idioms and many similar ones, come from feelings of modesty. In other words, the Japanese seem not to express frankly what they think. It may be possibly a fundamental characteristic of us Japanese.

Through studying the English language, we can understand many peculiar expressions or idioms like this not only in English, but also in Japanese.

I am sure it will be a great help to us to know ourselves from both sides, the good as well as bad points, and we will be able to improve ourselves in the true sense of the word.

The study of English has been a revelation to me, not only of the foreign language, but also of my own.

In order to keep the democratic function of the state fresh and clean, it is presupposed that we, the voters, should correct its crookedness by means of elections.

In a well-managed factory, for example, all machinery is kept in good repair down to the most minute parts. Unless they take great care of the machines from the moter to a gear wheel, and change old machinery or parts for new ones, the productivity will surely decline.

The same is true with politics. The Diet and the Cabinet, these motivating powers of politics have to be carefully managed by us, the voters. If we neglect the management, we will run off the track of democracy, as is often the case in

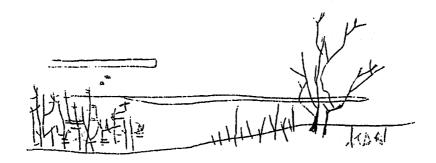
history. Managers will suffer a loss, when the management of a factory is neglected. And it is we, the people, that will suffer from damage by neglecting the management of politics, which is the election. The election is the only way by which we can secure good products of politics.

The great political thinker, Rousseau, ironically said, "People are masters during the election time only, and are servants during the rest of the time." But, in another sense, this means that we are masters at least during the election time. That is, by exercising our voting right intelligently we can do anything, even be the deciding factor to which way our country should go.

We can never escape from politics, whether we are interested or not. In this sense, how can we neglect the precious voting right which is the only way to participate in politics in democratic countries?

In the recent general election many public promises were made, and parties and candidates expressed their policies which sounded good and sweet to us. For some years beginning now, let us watch critically how these promises will be carried out. If we make this effort until the next election, the correct judgement will be obtained then. The prosperity of democracy depends upon the accumulation of these efforts.

Now let us re-appreciate the election. And let us all try to be the masters of democracy.

Inspite of freshman, I myself undertook the great task as the stagemanager's assistant and have been making efforts to accomplish my mission frantically. From the high school days, I have been interested not only in playing as one of the casts, but in making a drama itself, and at the third grade of my high school, I played a very important part in it.

Why I was so interested in making drama is that drama activity is in touch with all kinds of things and phenomena of our life, and as someone said, we can safely say "Life is Drama". Besides, it is because of my characteristics. For me, to make one thing for myself is well worth to live. If I can do it, there is no complain whether it is drama or not. And now we have finished our drama activity and are filled with a lot of satisfaction. Through the drama activity what can we get from it? I think no one can tell it, who have not experienced it himself. What we can get through the drama activity is impossible to say here. To make our drama better one, I should like to think about the problem of the defects of our drama in the light of the system of

E.S.S. itself.

Firstly, with only section members, such as one stage manager and one director, we started it in April. During the preparation, we met a deadlock many times, because of the want of co-operation of members. I dare not say that it was caused by the lack of study about drama itself and of self-consciousness of each member. So far as this present situation continues, we can not expect the desirable drama practice and study, and also cannot get a lot of satisfaction.

Secondly, I should like to say the fact that those who take part in drama activity one year, do not display any interests in it the next year. As a result, we must experience same troubles problems and obstacles each year. We wasted time and could not work effectively.

Thirdly, today its often said that once we are members of drama section, we cannot learn or study English except I think it's a question of the management of the drama activity, and we can settle such problems easily. For, we see American or English motion-pictures and study the play-books. We can learn many things in them about our drama. To correct this present situation, I suggest you the ideal form of our drama activity. At the beginning of the first semester, we have to make an application for inviting members. Suppose we can collect thirty members here, we can have a special study about drama itself and making a drama. We make the public collection of casts and staffs. leadership of drama should be taken by the drama section members. Till the day of public performance, we go on our activity with all members, centering the section members. And I don't want the complete sectionalism, so the members may attend other activities, such as debate contest and discussion and speech. If we adopt this method, we can get rid of the want of self-consciousness and study, and make our drama more efficient. In addition to it, there may be no obstacle in other sections because of drama section. Anyway I did my work and I, who have experienced Drama in freshman days and realized the importance of drama, cannot help saying something in order to make our great drama more greater.

TO LOSE ONESELF

Just before the opening of the last performance at Hitotsubashi Auditorium, I was praying with all my heart in the greenroom, intending to supply the short preparation for my part in five months.

And at one moment I could believe everything completely. I was Clara in Broocklyn. The man in front of me, gray-haired, in a orange sweater was not dandy Kunihiko Sakamoto who was a junior in the commercial department, but troublesome headstrong and babyish, my dear husband, Aaron.

And a blond, healthy youth by my side was not a smart Akio Murakoshi, who was very skillful in English, but my beloved son whom I wanted to show proudly to all the world.

The curtain of the last performance is too merciless. It commanded to separate me from Clara's love or feeling for Aaron, Sandy, Phil, Lawson or Carol:-those feelings which I had made efforts to get desperately for five months.

The moment I noticed that Broocklyn, candles----and Clara who loved them and my efforts that had tried to love them----did not exist any more, I could not help sobbing. The curtain of the last performance was too merciless.

Now I want to consider the meaning of the Drama. Is the all round prize everything? I think the meaning of the Drama of E.S.S. does not exist in such a thing. The all round prize is only an extra. More than one hundred people power into one aim their lives for a long time.——some people do almost of all their lives and some do a little part of it. The larger part of his life a person pours into the Drama, the bigger winning cup he can receive cup——which is not brightly golden but will never lose its gleam without polishing——which is named "emotion."

Just before the performance opened, a member of make-up section did a last touch-up on my face. I have never seen such heautiful eyes as the ones just in front of me. They are in

dead earnest and even mysterious.

I was very affected by the members of the properties section who examined their own works on the stage just before curtain time and by a member of staging section who stood by the door, causing it not to move. I want to give them a thousand thanks.

And players, directers and stage-managers. After the performances they might go to the barbershop and become so neat that they will be almost beyond recognition. But they, in dirty training uniforms surrounded by many desks and chairs in practice rooms, seemed to me more impressive. The all round prize is not everything. I think that the beauty of team-work and of building up something is the very meaning of the Drama in E.S.S.

Last year and this year also I took part in the Drama as a player. I learned many valuable things through these experiences. That is — if I wish to master something completely, I have to abandon vanity, show myself just as I and and look toward the end. The players on the stage are exposed to the audience form every side. Any lies and any hesitations are perceived immediately. The players must show out different persons from themselves through only five months' training. The best way to become another person is to lose ourselves and construct another person from the beginning. I learned that here, for the first time true advance existed.

Drama is a very long and deep activity. In five months too much doubt and bewilderment have occurred in my mind. "I wonder if the drama of E.S.S. is vain." "What will I become, doing such a thing?" "Drama is a valuable thing to do, at the sacrifice of everything or not?"

A thousand times I have talked to myself. That was the most agonizing thing for me through the Drama activity. Even now I have no complete answer to that question. And now I have made up my mind to take part in the Drama next year again.

This year I planned to do the things which I could not have done last year in the Drama, but, in fact, I couldn't. And next year I wish to develop one step more. How hard I do,

I do only a little things far away from my satisfaction. On the third day before the performance every year, I noticed I had done nothing and lost my head.

Next year's Drama begins on the very day when this year's Drama finished.

WHAT I NOW FEEL

What did I learn in 6 months' drama activity? There are so many things that I cannot tell you them all on this limited page, but most of all, deepest of them all, I felt how great and beautiful the co-operation of 120 people was. Naturally, there were differences of opinions in each step of our drama, but they came, all of them, out of wishes and efforts of each member who was willing to carry out a "good" drama. There existed no selfishness, no compromise, no sense of "material gain".

Drama activity is said to require a great sacrifice of us. It actually deprives us of many things as a typical example of circle activity. In a sense, however, it never is a sacrifice, it never really deprives us, it gives us——at least it gave me——something we cannot learn in the classroom or in a society which is based on interests. There was life, vitality, and youth——that is the priviledge of us as students.

Some of us, including myself, could not do anything else. Oftentimes we could not even attend lectures, and we had to give up other E.S.S. activities and our hobbies at home. But I am sure everyone learned or found out something, in his own way.

ADVERTISING CAMPAIGN EFFECTS

A characteristic feature of our era is advertising. Look at the display of commodities in the newspapers and magazines. They are overflowing with catch-phrases such as "Splendid high sense!", "You are dressed gorgeously", "The taste for top mode", "Accessories for making mood", and "Vacance Look". With our daily news, TV, etc, we are introduced to many different products. What interesting points of each have captured your attention?

Some are displays of toilet articles and others are those of wearing-apparel, food, etc. They are abstract and we cannot touch the content of the commodities, but in many cases, we are exhausted by their sales pitch, succumbing to these sales pressures and giving considerable thought to merchandize in which we are really not interested.

Then, what is mood? It means a state of mind. Our mood is affected by our surroundings and becomes a measure of our daily actions. Therefore, we are apt to forget whether each commodity has individuality and, what's more, we tend to lose our own purchasing perspective.

In the case of the "vacance look", was it an accident or was it created to satisfy a public mood?

The series of exchanges such as the expansion of mass-communication media, the beginning of an international economy following liberalization of trade, and the confusion of current organizations, have increased competition and market expansion.

This was a typical victory for a successful sales campaigh. These sales were enhanced by the modernization of living conditions and higher living standards. Recently, the sale of vacation products has increased greatly and the industry for leisure products has progressed rapidly.

People now expend a large amount of their income for casual wearing apparel, modern furniture and electric appliances in keeping with the decor of modern living. We now find a "casual clothes revolution" in our daily life. We have special clothes to wear only in our homes, some for sports, some for social activities and so forth, while, previous to World War II, one type would have served all these purposes. People now desire separate wearing apparel for leisure in addition to necessary clothing. So individual's expenses for clothes have steadily increased. Today, people want to be westernized in every field. Because of this mood for modern living, a great deal of influence has been developed for the "vacance look" sales. We are overwhelmed in the case of toilet articles, foods, automobiles, means of transpotation and wearing apparel.

This publicity has bad a great effect on our mood. In the early period, this "vacance look" was a now theme. It was transmitted through mass communication media and made known prior to advertising campaigns by television or magazines. Through these other means, the people were first attracted to modern living products. Of course, inspending our money, we act with regularity, but not always with rationality. What people consider to be absolute necessities are not actual necessities, but of conventional social desirability only. However it still remains true that many Japanese are more easily influenced by advertising than ever before in history.

Let us make the decision for ourselves.

CONSTRUCTIVE SPEECH (affirmative)

Shibuya Home Meeting

We of the affirmative stand resolved that the veto

power should be abolished in the United Nations Security Council. In developing our arguments, we would like to explain what the veto power is. The purpose of the United Nations is to maintain international peace and security and to this end the Security Council was set up. Article 27, Paragraph 3 of the United Nations charter clearly states, "Decisions of the Security Council on non-procedual matters shall be made by an affirmative vote of seven members including the concurring votes of the permanent members in the Security Council". This article means that the permanent members have the special right of overruling any decision which seems to be unprofitable to them. This special right given only to the permanent members is the veto power.

We are strongly opposed to this veto power system for the following reasons.

First, the veto power is now quite out of date. the United Nations was established, the world situation has drastically changed. The days have gone when the world was completely influenced only the big powers, for Afro-Asian group has become to play an important role. In 1956 when this tendency was beginning, "Lo Monde" the most reputable newspaper in France, said, "The United Nations having been sailed by the will of the West has made remarkable The big powers can no longer control many minor change. members at their own will as they did ten years ago." In fact, there are as many as 55 Afro-Asian countries which govern 6 times as large as area and 4 times as big population as Europe. The United Nations had 51 original members, and now its membership has increased to 111 during 18 years. In this sense, the veto power has lost its ground.

Second, recent Russia-America approach has made the existence of the veto power quite baseless. The veto power, at present, is symbolizing nothing but distrust and power diplomacy among the big nations. The big power themselves realize that the Cold War never gives birth to eternal peace. The U-2 jetplane Accident and the Cuban crisis made the big powers recognize that the human race would be ruined if the East-West comflict went on. As facts, Washington-Moscow hot line was established, the American wheat is being exported to the Soviet Union and the nuclear teat ban treaty was concluded. Needless to say, both President Kenedy and Premier

Khrushchev have adopted the peaceful co-existence policy these days. The people of the World has finally got a step out of the Cold War and are willing to get the peace hand in hand. At this time, on such moment, there is no need to maintain the system of veto symbolized nothing but mutual distrust and power policy.

Third, the veto power put the Security Council, which has primary responsibilities to the maintenance of international peace and security into paralysis many times. The United Nations could not take any effective measures while Hungary was in uproar by the invasion of Russian Army in 1956. This was only because of the veto. This illustration shows that the veto power is nothing but an obstacle toward world peace.

With these reasons mentioned above, you can easily understand the veto power is completely against the current world denies the progress of human race. The people of the world has already started to show the positive attitude to gain the eternal peace by their hands. Peace is not the problem only of the big powers, but the problem of all nations. Therefore the veto power should by all means be abolished.

CONSTRUCTIVE SPEECH (negative)

Akihabara Home Meeting

World War II ended at last in 1945 with sacrifices beyond description. In spite of the fact that in their minds they wanted peace and security, they had faught many useless wars. Now the time was ripe for eternal world peace.

The United Nations was born of the desperate efforts of the people by amending the League of Nations which could not maintain the peace and security of the world.

The League of Nations contained some great defects. Big nations such as the U.S.A. and U.S.S.R. were not its members.

Its decisions did not have any restrictive power to settle international disputes as provided by its Covenant.

The main purpose of the United Nations is to maintain world peace and security and to establish international cooperation. As its characteristics, the Security Council takes effective measures for the prevention and removal of threats to the peace, as provided by Article 1 of the Charter. They admit the veto of the great powers in the Security Council based upon the principle of complete agreement of the great powers.

At present we can not but admit that great powers with great economic and military strength can contribute toward world peace more than the small and medium nations. There will be no guarantee for world peace without their agreements.

Accordingly the agreement of the great powers must be indispensable factor for the peace of the world.

Paragraph 3 of Article 27 of the U.N. Charter states; The desision of the Security Council on all other matters shall be made by an affirmative votes of seven members including the concurring votes of the permanent members; provided that in decision under chapter 4 and under paragraph 3 of Article 52, a party to a dispute shall obtain from voting.

It seems to limit the rights of the small and medium nations. However, it never goes against the sovereign equality of its members.

As the former chief judge of the Supreme Court, Kisaburo Yokota states, the United Nations should take effective and prompt actions for the prevention and removal of threats to the peace. It is very proper that the Security Council should take the great responsibilities.

As Chapter 7 of the UN Charter provides, the Security Council should take enforcement measures as a final means to settle international disputes. In such a case no one can deny the necessity of the military and economic strength of the great powers. This is also one of the reasons why only the great power have the veto.

Therefore there is a natural enough reason for the establishment of the veto if we understand this aspect of international policy. However we admit there is no perfect thing on this earth, and the veto have not been complete.

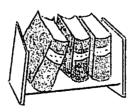
Accordingly we present the amendment in order to correct the defects of the Charter.

- 1. Double veto case
- 2. Case of admission of new members
- 3. Case of Pacific settlement of disputes

In the addition to the limit provided in the Charter, in these cases, the veto should not be used. It is meaningless to say that the veto should be abolished because of a few defects.

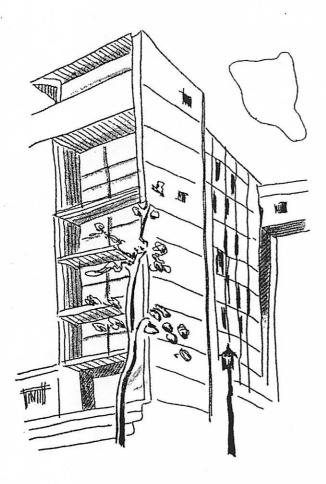
We should be constructive. That is, because we appreciate the value of the veto, we should try to make it better and better by excluding those defects. We are going to refer to details in our second constructive speech.
