
Action takes its place in either side of the wall which was built in 1961 and still exists in Berlin, East Germany. Time is one night in early winter.

SOLDIER 2 notices that he is deceived and will hurt BOY. So MAN stabbs SOLDIER 2 helplessly. MAN and BOY trys to get over the wall, but MAN notices that they cannot both go without steps. MAN hands his baby to BOY and helps him over. Then SOLDIER 2 shoots BOY and he's dead. Only MAN's baby goes over and into his mother's arms.

Lastly, I would like to offer cordial thanks to Mr. Takayanagi, the President of our Association and at the same time to all the people supporting our plannings and managements.

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
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
